


Saturday 18th November 2017 My work as a dendrochronologist




Venus Figurines in Roman Britain by Mathew Fittock

'Gaulish style' pipeclay figurines of Venus may reflect Classical ideas about love or provincial ideas that might relate to fertility and protection. This paper explores religious practices and provincial beliefs associated with the 401 Venus figurines made in Gaul found in Britain through a study of their distribution.

Roman Factory in Provence by Andrew Hutt

At Barbegal, some 12km north east of Arles in Provence in southern France, are the remains of a Roman factory. It was built in the 1st century AD, on the line of two aqueducts carrying water from the Alpilles Hills to Arles. Only two other mills like this have been found in the Roman world.
